COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS 1941 - 1950 March 5, 1941

Special meeting of the Board of Directors called to order by President Art Gieseking at the Ferry Hotel \*

Charter Night, Tuesday, May 17, 1941, Spring Lake Country Club. 144 guests, 37 members present. Meal cost: \$1.50.

Two road signs purchased "to be put up at the entrance to the city together with the plates showing the place and time of the meeting."

Became a member of the Grand Haven Chamber of Commerce.

Raised the price of meals to 80 cents.

Organized a Career Day.

Conducted a "White Elephant Sale".

Kiwanis Queens get 25% of White Elephant Sale proceeds.

Pledged to raise at least \$400.00 for the Community Chest.

Purchased \$500.00 worth of "E" Bonds for the underprivileged children's fund.

Agreed to sponsor a hard ball league.

Contributed to Goodfellows and Michigan Tuberculosis Society.

"Motion by Babcock supported by Ginter we limit the membership ... to 70 members." - December 13, 1943.

Sponsored March of Dimes.

Donated to the American Red Cross.

Sponsored a Sea Scout Ship.

Purchased postcards to send to servicemen overseas.

Sponsored Big Brother movement in conjunction with Rotary and Juvenile Court.

Took on a project to take charge of the Preinduction Program for inductees.

Supported the Community League Lecture Series.

Sent \$25.00 to the Ann Arbor Hospital Fund.

Voted to "increase the membership from 75 to 80." - November 12, 1945.

"Emergency meeting, 8:00 p.m. [January 15, 1946]. For the purpose of selecting a meeting place while fire damage is being repaired at the Methodist Church."

Bought eggs for the Easter Egg Hunt.

Authorized funds to support High School band at Michigan State College.

Held a paper drive.

Donated to the Percy Jones Hospital Christmas Gift Fund.

"Increase membership to 85." - January 3, 1947.

Sent two boys to Boy's State.

A "Kiwanis - Kane", a lighted cane for the blind, was given to a local blind person.

"John Van Schelven made a motion to raise the membership ceiling from 85 to 90." - March 29, 1948.

Approved a Horse Show to be held July 9, 1949.

Bought two memberships for "deserving youngsters" to the Highland Park Tennis Club.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROJECTS 1951 - 1960 Manned the Polio Plank for the March of Dimes every January, both in Grand Haven and Sspring Lake.

Served dinner to the football team after each home game.

Sponsored two boys to Wolverine Boy's State.

"A dinner party was held at the Spring Lake Country Club with spouses. The dinner was a steak that melted in your mouth." - March 1955.

Sent one or two children to a speech clinic for several years.

Planted evergreen trees on club owned land for soil conservation and animal habitat. Many work bees for planting and pruning were held by the club.

Undertook the project of building a housing unit at the Boy Scout facility at Camp Kirk. Building completed and presented to the Grand Valley Council in October, 1958.

The entire club and spouses took a trip on the Coast Guard Cutter Woodbine to White Lake for "buoy tending." A fine meal was served aboard the ship and everyone had a fine time.

"On Tuesday, October 21, 1941 the wives of 19 members of the Kiwanis Club met at the home of Mrs. Marian Sherwood to form a Kiwani - Queens Club... The motion was made and seconded that the dues be set at (\$.25) twenty five cents per month."

Provided funds for glasses for needy children.

Formed a committee to work on the Rotary - Kiwanis picnic to be held July 15.

Paid transportation for two children so they could attend Grand Haven High School.

Sponsored a nursery school for children of mothers working on the war effort.

Contributed to the Girl Scouts.

Contributed to the Red Cross.

Contributed to the March of Dimes.

Gave \$200.00 toward the purchase of an oxygen tent for Grand Haven Municipal Hospital.

Donated \$50.00 to the polio fund.

Contributed to an area dental hygiene project.

Supported the Community Chest.

Purchased shoes and glasses for needy children.

Distributed literature for the cancer drive.

Gave \$100.00 to the eye testing program.

Assisted with the hearing clinic.

"A motion was made...we investigate the needs of the Grand Haven triplets."
